Thimble and Thread Quilt Guild Meeting

October 9, 2021

The meeting was opened by President Denise Poepsel at Shrewsbury City Center (the second month at this new location) who introduced the presenters from **MODERN SERVICE QUILTS**: Kristy Daum, founder of the St. Louis Modern Quilt Guild, Lilo Whitener-Fey, machine quilter, and Jessica Schunke. Modern Service Quilts enlists modern quilt pattern designers by choosing one of their existing patterns or a new one, and agrees to donate part of the pattern sales money to a veterans organization. A modern quilt often has solids as negative space, saturated colors, could include linear designs, and may use reclaimed fabric. The fabrics are not limited to red, white, and blue. At the beginning of the month, they show how to sew the quilt, and at the end of the month, they show the quilts they've made. To become a member, you can sign up on their website <u>www.modernservicequilts.com</u>.

All of these charity quilts are donated to veteran service organizations while also highlighting lesser-known veterans' groups (homeless, LGTB, gay and bisexual, transgender, etc.). A list of many veteran organizations focused on a variety of veteran causes is listed on their website.

Sometimes the quilters do big stitch quilting and binding (this method utilizes contrasting colors with thick thread or up to 6 strands of embroidery floss and just goes up and down in the binding to show off the thread). The patterns are throw size, but borders can easily be added to make them larger. Some designers include multiple sizes in their patterns. Many of the quilts being sewn are examples of upcycled fabric from charity thrift stores including sheets and clothing.

Old Business: The quilt retreat for 2022 is set for October 28-October 30. There will be a minimum of 30.

Adele Niblack spoke of the upcoming Global Quilt Connection Zoom programs to be presented. Our guild has paid \$100 to be able to see these presentations: October 2 and 3, presentations by various quilters will be from 2 p.m.-5 p.m.; on October 13 and 15, teacher studio tours will be available from 3-4:30 p.m, and 4 videos of 180 quilt teachers are available anytime. Co-vice-presidents Adele Niblack and Cindy Neville distributed a survey of possible topics for upcoming programs.

Denise Poepsel announced that there were still some additional members of the board needed:

- 1. Membership: Lavonne Patterson and Gay Stuart volunteered.
- 2. Ways and Means: no one volunteered at the meeting.
- 3. Newsletter: Kathy Sherrick and Patty Thompson volunteered.

New Business: 31 members were present at this meeting. The minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter. There will be a board meeting somewhere between Mon., Oct. 25 and Thursday, October 28. Denise Poepsel sent in updated information about our guild to the Missouri State Quilt Guild. If anyone in the quilt guild member gets sick, tell an officer and Denise Poepsel will send them a card.

The November meeting will be on Quilted Memories with quilt batting lady from Overland Park, Kansas. At the December meeting, donations for Home Sweet Home will be collected, especially the kitchen utensils (pizza cutters, can openers, etc.).

Charity quilts: 7 were donated at the meeting, 23 were received at the retreat. Attendance prize: 2 books or 1 book and 1 small quilted item. Fabric raffle had 3 winners. Show and Tell had a lot of charity quilts, many of those quilted free of charge by members Ruth Grimes and Leah Anne Huckaby. Denise Poepsel showed an alternative to those colorful, expensive quilting wonder clips--1" wooden clothespins available in packages of 50 for \$1 at Dollar Tree.

The Milwaukee Art Museum is having a beautiful quilt exhibit of the works of Pauline Parker through December. You can tour it virtually at no charge by going to the link

The Quilts of Pauline Parker features more than thirty objects that showcase the artist's expressive approach to quiltmaking, illustrating how Parker transformed a traditionally domestic craft into one that highlighted current events, historical and biblical figures, and her own travels and experiences. Parker studied painting at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, but her work in fabric began in Wisconsin, where she moved upon retirement. She initially worked with traditional patterns and used techniques she had learned from her mother and aunts, before expanding her subject matter, stitching more freely, and exploring a less traditional approach to quiltmaking.

The narrative quilts, or "fabric collages" as Parker termed them, featured in the exhibition were all made between the late 1980s and early 2000s.
