Julie Tucker will set up the meeting access and forward a "Mailchimp" email to all members the week before the meeting. Adele Niblack will supervise the meeting. Barb Fisher from Sweet Babies will be the main speaker for the April 9, 2021 Guild Meeting

The President of Sweet Babies, the St. Louis agency where many of the Guild members' charity quilts are donated, will be the speaker at the April meeting. Barb Fisher, who is the niece of the founder, Alice Provaznik, will bring us up to date on the programs, needs, and current status of Sweet Babies.

Since it was started in 2010, the program has grown, and the "Sweet Babies bag" now consists of over 30 items of clothing, ranging in sizes from 0-3 months up to 12 months, hats, socks, bibs, burp cloths, receiving and baby blankets, books, 60 diapers, a small package of baby wipes, and something warm to wear. The number of families who are served through the SSM Health Center (formerly St. Mary's Hospital) has grown from around 10 per month in 2010 to approximately 70 per month now.

Second presentation at the April Guild Meeting

Anne Hennig, a member of T&T, will give us a short update on the City Sewing Room at 6700 Arsenal. The Sewing Room has recently received 501c3 non - profit status. Their mission is dedicated to sharing the love of sewing with anyone who wants to learn. Anne will especially highlight the longarm quilting aspect.

Charity Quilting

We are currently donating quilts to two organizations, Sweet Babies and Home Sweet Home. **Sweet Babies** supplies needy parents delivering at St Mary's hospital with baskets of items that new parents need. Diapers, books, outfits, changing pads, blankets and of course quilts. The usual size is about 40"x 50", but smaller quilts make awesome care seat/stroller/ tummy time gifts.

Home Sweet Home is an organization that helps homeless families/individuals when they get an apartment. The client 'shops' for everything that will make an apartment a home, including furniture, lamps, kitchen utensils, dishes, pillows, pots and pans, and linens. The client shops in the morning and their items are delivered the same afternoon. Home Sweet Home can use lap size non-baby quilts 50"x60" or larger quilts to use on beds. Most of the clients are adults with some children. Home Sweet Home will pick up donations of furniture, call (314) 448-9838.

Sally and Jessie Koczan have made numerous kits for baby quilts and Jeanette Oesterly is willing to deliver quilt kits or pick up quilts if a reasonable distance from Brentwood.

Minutes from March 12, 2021 Guild Meeting

Cindy Bell Neville opened meeting with 27 members looking on, Adele Niblack on way from from trip and will join soon. Cindy introduced our speaker,

Suzanne Galli Koenen, "Apple Grove Gallery", who gave a powerpoint program on "Scraps, Strips and Snippets". Suzanne approaches any project as an "Artist" first and is more comfortable using solid fabrics for her creations, not knowing where she will use them in the future. Suzanne never throws any size piece of fabric away from larger projects and stores them by size in "Really Useful Box", a British Co. product that Office Depot/Max carries, in different sizes and stores well. Suzanne had lots of samples and examples of her works in progress to give us great ideas for using her process of layering fabrics on tissue paper or stabilizing fabric as Fabric Solvy or Tear Away, both water soluble that wash out. She first showed us how she sewed layers of fabrics on pieces of tissue paper, cut 2 12" by 22" long for foundation building, that rolls up for easy storage. Sometimes hard for needle to go thru tissue paper and now prefers water soluble materials to use as base. She never plans out angle or dimension of pieces used to create strips, not patterns, but likes to use ONE fabric throughout what she sews together (maybe BLACK) then when used in a project it has some semblance of planning in the finished project. Suzanne had samples of 8" block foundation pieces that she made into a whole wallhanging.

Her samples were great and gave us good foundation to try ourselves. Hope to see some projects in "Show and Tell". Suzanne shared a lot of her ideas, always uses the best thread she has. Suzanne answered any questions that members had after the presentation, and she welcomes any feedback from participants to help in honing the program. Thanks Suzanne for sharing with us.

Adele made it back home to continue the meeting.

Susan Sanders, Retreat Coordinator, said 8 people have signed up for the Retreat.

Jeannette Oesterly, Charity Quilts, said they have "LOTS" of kits already cut up, just let her know and she'll deliver.

They have 18 for ready for delivery for "Sweet Babies" and 3 for "Home Sweet Home". We are not really working on baby quilts for "Nurses for Newborns"/

Adele will work on getting representatives from these organizations to speak at our meetings.

Lillian Seese said that "Charity Sharity" is still in process of finding a new location.

Cindy Bell Neville working on wedding quilt with mother-in-law long distance, and being a photographer, finds it useful to explain ideas thru photos better than verbally over the phone.

Adele mentioned that "Global Quilt Connection" a group of 100 National Quilters, offering lectures from \$300-\$500 for 40 minute lectures for guilds is offering "ALL STAR VIRTUAL SAMPLER PLATTER"

on May 22 and 23, where 18 teachers would give 15 minute presentation for \$50.00.

What this means is that any paid member would have access to view this opportunity just because the guild signed up for it for just \$50.00. There is no extra cost for individual members.

Adele made a motion to sign the guild up for this and Giselle Rucker 2nd.

Adele will follow thru and update us in the next newsletter.

Adele also thinking about guild meeting outside somewhere and is looking for members to help her find a convenient location.


Ongoing at the St. Louis Art Museum

Thimble & Thread Retreat 2021

October 1 – October 3, 2021

WOW! Some of you are as ready as I am to go to retreat. Actually, with each passing month, I feel "more ready". Don't know what I will be working on yet, but I miss seeing each and every one of you in person. As of this writing, we have 11 people signed up for retreat. There are still a lot of the "regulars" whom I haven't heard from yet.

Dates are October 1st thru 3rd. Check-in time will be 9 am on Friday, October 1st; check-out time will be 2 pm on Sunday, October 3rd.

The price per person did not change – a nice thing in these uncertain times. However, our contract is for a minimum of 25 people instead of 20 as we did last year, so we are committed to pay for that any people even if we don't have 25 people sign up. Price is \$245 per person, single occupancy room.

I am taking reservations now. Per Guild by-laws, retreats require a 50% down payment at time of registration. Please make your check payable to Thimble and Thread Quilt Guild and send to me (905 N. Woodlawn, Kirkwood, MO 63122). And please be a little patient – once I receive your check, I will sign you up for the retreat and then forward your check to the treasurer to be deposited. I will probably only forward them once or twice a month depending on how many come in. I will acknowledge receipt of your check/registration by email so you at least know that I received it.

I did check with Pallottine to see if they had any guidelines regarding vaccinations and because the vaccines are still under "emergency use" they can only say they recommend that people get vaccinated. That being said, a number of those already signed up for the Retreat and of those who attended the last Guild Zoom meeting thought that requiring attendees to be vaccinated was a good idea. So, in order for us all to be safe and to be able to move freely about (sans masks) we are asking that everyone please get vaccinated.

The layout of our work areas will not be known until later this year. A lot will depend on how well we get the Coronavirus under control and how Pallottine decides to handle the layout of their facility.

MY SIMPLE REALIZATION

"Repetition Fuels Creativity"

Ceramist FRANCES PALMER expands her point of view with each new pot she makes.

SINCE CHILDHOOD, I've watched the same movies and read the same books many times over. With each viewing or reading, I discover a different idea or inspiration. My understanding of the artist or author deepens, and I appreciate the work all the more. It is a similar exploration with my pottery-through my repetition of forms, I find an aspect in the making that I had not previously imagined. And there are recipes I've made so many times I could make them blindfolded, yet they never taste exactly the same.

I have thrown thousands of pots over the years, including some shapes I form again and again. I work in the studio practi-

cally every day, yet I never find it boring or monotonous-in fact, I look forward to showing up each morning. I once attended a lecture by the artist Carrie Mae Weems, and she clarified something I had long been trying to define. In discussing how artists explore the same theme over and over, she mentioned that Louis Armstrong recorded "St. Louis Blues" more than 80 times, each version with a different sound. This helped me understand why each time I'm making a pot-no matter how large or small or how often I've made the same shape-I learn something new and find a fresh way to articulate my intention.
